Class News






In Lion Class we have been enjoying exploring our topic of The Ocean. We have been learning all about the different creatures living in the

In Talk4writing, children learnt their model text, a story about a sea turtle and then innovated it about their own animal. Children have enjoyed playing ultimate frisbee in PE, working on their accuracy of throws. In Numeracy, children have been working on a range of topics using concrete resources and pictorial methods to help them. They are growing in their independence of using Maths Whizz and trialling different resources to help them. Well done Rowan class!




this into practice by keeping the Rhino classroom hoovered and tidy.

completing a biography about him and making incredible underwater scenes of scuba divers, coral reefs, fish and submarines using Duplo in water!



Turtle class have been immersing themselves in our new story; "Ocean meets sky." We have learnt about the five different oceans and some interesting facts.

The Children have been researching creatures that interest them and that live in the oceans. In science and technology we explored the depths of the ocean and what it looks like at the bottom and at different layers during an experiment. The children participated in what may happen when different liquids were added and naturally incorporated their learning of capacity.

We have been learning about Jacques Cousteau, an inventor of breathing apparatus and an explorer of the sea. We looked at how underwater technology has transformed over the years.







Turtle Class have been working hard on their numeracy and have gained lots of confidence using their computer skills to access Google to research across the curriculum and to access educational maths whizz or number bots.





In Numeracy we drew out our own place value charts and used base 10 to help us understand column addition.





In Global studies, we spend a lesson looking at different bodies of water. As we learnt about each one, the class drew their own representation on the table and labelled it. We will definitely continue to use the tables as giant whiteboards as the year continues! It has been a very busy, short half term in Jellyfish class. Our topic has been Oceans and their habitats. Jellyfish class has learned the differences between the 5 oceans, habitats underwater and how

animals adapt to their environment.

One of their favourite lessons has been forest school; the cold weather certainly hasn't held them back planting and creating art out of natural materials.



Our focus book has been 'The little turtle' and the class has used their imagination to create their own wonderful stories about a little turtle in the ocean.

Shark Class have thoroughly enjoyed their topic of 'Under the Sea' and conducted lots of experiments to help

They worked hard to create a beautiful and informative display all about the animals that exist at different depths in the sunlight, twilight, midnight, abyssal, and hadal zone!


information about animal adaptations, ocean pollution and life cycles.

This Half Term has seen the first signs of spring at Pathways, with our students beginning to plant seeds and prepare the garden, ready for the better weather.


In Maths, we have been practising directions and route planning, to support students to become more independent when they are out in the community.

Careers Event – Festival of Knowledge

Early in March there was an opportunity for two classes to visit The Royal Norfolk Showground to take part in a Careers Fair. Pathways and Maple Class were able to enjoy this opportunity.

As the 'quiet' hour was the first slot of the morning there were very few special schools able to get there, meaning it was very quiet. In many ways this was good thing as our pupils were able to access all of the stalls easily and got lots of attention from the companies and training providers. It was disappointing

however that the pupils were not able to engage with other students like themselves as they have done in previous years.

Pupils took part in several of the activities such as driving a 'virtual' tractor with John Deere, shooting goals into a net with Norwich City Football in the Community, as well as the usual collection of free pens and bags etc.

City/Easton/Paston College was well represented this year with information and staff who were directly able to engage with our pupils, something which Emily and I have long campaigned for.

It was a pleasure to see that most of the pupils enjoyed this experience. I was also pleased that most pupils were aware of their likely levels for leaving Parkside/
Pathways (For these classes Entry Level 1, 2 or 3) and were able to talk confidently to prospective employers and Further Education Providers about their future options.

Add the curry powder or spice and fry for a minute.














Put the beans, chopped sausage, grated cheese and vegetables into a bowl.


